<b>Chamber Position</b>	The Chamber Board is recommending a yes vote on the issue.						
The Basics	While many quality behavioral health treatment and support services are being provided in Larimer County, the current continuum of services being offered is not sufficient to meet the needs of the many people who have mental illnesses and/or substance use disorders. As a result, these people often simply can't get the level of care in this community that they need to address their illness.						
	A study that identified the gaps in the continuum was completed by the Community Mental Health and Substance Abuse Partnership of Larimer County. Through their work, they identified the following needs in Larimer County:						
	<ul> <li>41,000 Larimer County residents are estimated to have some form of mental illness with another 30,000 estimated to have a substance use disorder. In 2016, more than 26,600 Larimer County residents needed, but did not receive, behavioral health care services.</li> <li>In Larimer County, many types and levels of care simply do not exist, payment options are limited and long wait times for services are ever present.</li> <li>The community needs: a new detox, mental and behavioral health facility that would provide round-the-clock services including Medically monitored withdrawal; Residential treatment for substance use disorders; Acute treatment unit; Intensive outpatient treatment; and Support services for mental health crisis.</li> </ul>						
	The Proposal						
	A three-pronged approach:						
	1. Expand and enrich local behavioral health services across the						
	County (distributive services)						
	2. Facilitate connections between community-based services with						
	services/providers in a centralized facility providing a strong care						
	coordination system and building transition bridges across						
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- providers and services in and outside of the facility (Distributive and In-Facility Services)
- 3. Build a regional behavioral health facility to provide coordinated care and crisis services (Facility Services)

A new 55,000-square-foot, round the clock detox and mental health facility would serve 5,000 people annually and would:

- Provide onsite medical clearance/triage as well as patientcentered assessment services to get people to the right level of care
- Provide stabilization services for people experiencing mental health crises (relocation of current Crisis Stabilization Unit to the new facility)
- Provide a safe place for people to withdraw from alcohol and/or drugs and begin medication-assisted treatment when appropriate (2.8 days to 12 days)
- Facility entry into treatment after stabilization of mental health crises and/or after detoxification from substances
- Provide intensive residential treatment for substance use disorders

The 40 acres of land would be donated by the county at the northwest corner of the intersection of South Taft Hill Road and Trilby Road. The expected cost for construction is estimated at \$29 million with anticipated annual costs to operate the facility of \$1 million. The annual cost or provide all recommended services in the center and the community is estimated at \$15.2 million.

The sales tax would be .25% (25 cents per \$100 spent) and is estimated to generate \$15,700,000-\$19,000,000 per year for a span of 20 years. The majority of the first two years of the tax would be dedicated to constructing a facility and the remaining 18 years of the tax would go to operations, maintenance, community services, client assistance and crisis services.

Arguments for the Proposal	<ul> <li>Mental health is an important issue in our community, and one that is currently not being addressed adequately. Currently, individuals with mental and behavioral health problems are sent either to jail or the emergency room which costs tax payers far more than traditional behavioral health services.</li> <li>For every \$1 invested in mental health treatment, we spend \$4-\$7 less on criminal justice and hospitalizations.</li> <li>Average emergency room visit is \$2500, and ambulance costs of \$1,200 per transport. Average detox cost per day \$205.</li> <li>Average jail cost per person/per day \$113 with annual cost to Larimer county of \$12,000,000 for 106,077 jail bed days held by inmates reporting either a mental health of substance abuse issue.</li> <li>Average annual mental health treatment per person \$1551.</li> <li>Emergency room visits can be reduced by over 45% when patients are provided with needed mental health treatment.</li> </ul>						
Arguments Against the Proposal	<ul> <li>The tax is too high.</li> <li>If this is a priority, the County should make room for it in its current budget.</li> <li>Government shouldn't be in the business of providing behavioral health care.</li> <li>Is there a way to use the current infrastructure to serve this need?</li> </ul>
