Where Hybrid makes sense


- You want rich interaction between all participants
- Impractical to bring everyone to one location
- Not effective to do event multiple times in different locations








2 groups are 1 audience









Conversation, not just presentation!


- Real time interaction

- Image on screen

















Owl videoconferencing device

Contains cameras and microphones







The production laptop

- Hardwired connection if Wifi is unreliable
- Zoom (as event host)
- Web browser (for displaying web pages)
- PowerPoint (for showing slides)
- Two monitors
 - 1. Showing on projector
 - 2. Other prep stuff:
 - Zoom chat, participants
 - Web browser, email
 - File Explorer windows

The more you run, the flakier the computer will be







Breakout rooms Sorry!

- Attendees in the room don't have individual Zoom identities
- So you can't combine individuals in the room with individuals on Zoom
- Separate the two audiences for small group exercises





The Producer role

- Setting up audio & video
- Paying attention to what both audiences are seeing and hearing:

	Audio	Video
In room	On the speakers Microphones live People speaking into mics	Shown on screen Pointing camera
On Zoom	Setting level People muted	Spotlighting speaker Showing slides etc.

- Cueing up configuration changes
- Recording, waiting room, muting people
- Watching chat, raising hands
- Preparing polls, videos, breakouts, transition points







Configurations

Beginning event	 People welcoming each other Passive slides Background music Countdown timer 	
Introduction, announcements	Gallery or speaker view on screen, not spotlightingNo slides	
Local presenter	 Slides/video shown from production laptop or separate speaker's laptop Spotlight the speaker 	
Zoom presenter	Slides/video shown from remote speaker's computerSpotlight the speaker	
Group discussion	Gallery mode on screen, perhaps chat	
Breakout rooms	 Split into in-room exercises and Zoom breakout rooms – totally separated Keep track of time to bring people back together into one conversation

Remember!

- There is more visible in the room than what's on camera
- There is more audible in the room than what's caught on mic
- People on Zoom can easily disengage
- Zoom experience differs based on device (computer, tablet, phone, audio)
- It's easy to forget the people on Zoom
- It's easy to forget the people in the room
- Clearly document everything about your configuration
- Test it again before the meeting, and after you start up Zoom
- Verify the Zoom experience using your phone or another computer








Overload is real
